Felix Cohen: Father of Federal Indian Law

Dalia Tsuk Mitchell will discuss influential legal scholar Felix Cohen, whose experiences as a Jewish American deeply influenced his career and legal philosophy and helped shape his reworking of federal Indian law in the 1930s. The lecture takes place in the beautiful New Deal-era auditorium at the Department of the Interior, where Cohen worked in the Solicitor's office.
