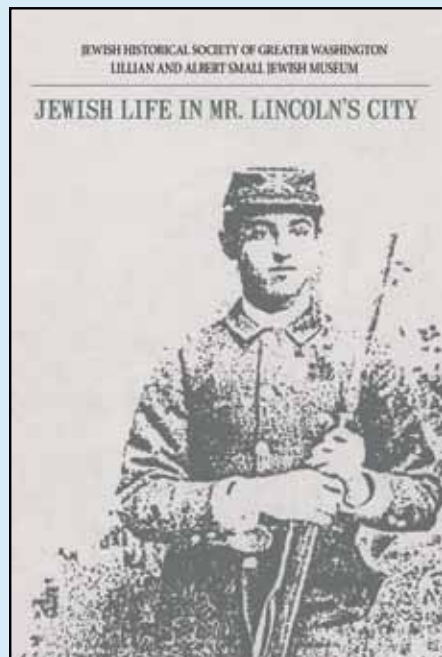
ILLUSTRATED LECTURE:

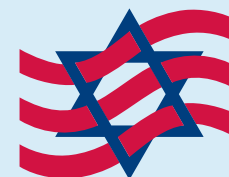
